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Between January 27 and February 14, 2025, MCEA members will have the opportunity to determine which path we, as a union, will take in the future by electing five of your colleagues to serve on the MCEA Board of Directors. The election will be conducted electronically. You will be sent a secure link via email and must vote by 5:00 p.m. on February 14, 2025.

For five vacant MCEA Director positions, members can vote for two of five candidates for Elementary School Director, one of two candidates for Middle School Director, and two of five candidates for At-Large Director.

On the following pages, please find (if provided by the candidate) the bios and photographs for each candidate. All bios were provided by the candidates and are presented here unaltered.

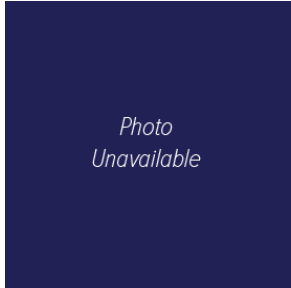
Those elected will serve from July 1, 2025 - June 30, 2028. During their term, the winners of this internal MCEA election will oversee a contract negotiation. They will also guide our union through public elections for board of education, county council, county executive, governor, state legislators, and members of Congress.

In August 2020, despite there being no COVID vaccines, teachers were forced to return to work in person or lose their licensure. Teachers who engaged in civic action over the summer, on their own time, were threatened with disciplinary action when they returned for preservice. The union was toothless and I

experienced firsthand what life can be like with a toothless union. That's why, after coming up for the Women's March in October 2020, I decided that it was time for me to make a change. It was time to make a new home somewhere I could facilitate a better quality of life for my family; somewhere my efforts would be more impactful. I started in MCPS on January 4, 2021.

As a special education teacher, I work with MCEA members in every position within the school to ensure that students' IEPs are implemented. I will make a special point to reach out to those who don't have a large team or counterpart in the schools, such as content-area specialists, specials (art, music, P.E., media, STEM) teachers, ELD teachers, special education teachers, counselors, pre-k teachers, and speech language pathologists and other related service providers. 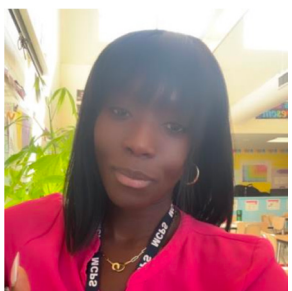

Kathryn Spivey, *Benjamin Banneker MS*

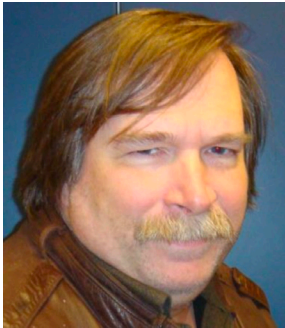
